

MINUTES September 7, 2010

Minutes of the regular meeting of the Board of Trustees of the Village of Elkhart Lake held on Tuesday, September 7, 2010 at the Grashorn Memorial Civic Center in the Village of Elkhart Lake with the agenda having been duly posted on Thursday, September 2, 2010 between the hours of 3:11 P.M. and 3:40 P.M. at National Exchange Bank and Trust, the Elkhart Lake Post Office, Community Bank and Trust and the Municipal Office and posted on the Village web site at 1:00 P.M.

President Rudnick called the meeting to order at 7:02 P.M. with the following trustees present: Richard Sadiq, Rola Ann Klahn, Pam Garton, Mike Wolf and Steven Kapellen. Trustee Lynn Shovan was absent.

Others in attendance included: Jeanette Moioffer, Clerk; Mike Klahn, Jeff Grady and Emmitt Feldner of the Review.

The Pledge of Allegiance was recited.

It was the consensus of the Board that Items IX A – Closing of “Cutoff Street” Saturday, September 11, 2010 Community UCC Brat Fry and IX B – Triathlon and Marathon, Jeff Grady would be heard right after “Public Comment.”

Approval of Minutes –

(Klahn/Sadiq) moved to approve the minutes of August 2, 16, 18 and 23rd, 2010, as corrected.

Treasurer’s Report – Moioffer

(Klahn/Sadiq) moved to approve the August 2010 Treasurer’s report as printed.

Public Comment – None

IX.A. Closing of “Cutoff Street” Saturday, September 11, 2010 Community UCC Brat Fry

Mike Klahn stated that Community UCC will not hold the brat fry on that Saturday as not enough volunteers could be found.

IX.B. Triathlon and Marathon

Jeff Grady discussed the triathlon and marathon. Grady stated it was the largest turnout ever for the triathlon and this allowed them to continue to provide gifts back to the community. The community support was outstanding. There were three main concerns for the triathlon: spectator access (lilies were trampled), pedestrian walkway access (add a sign in the future saying the triathlon has permission to set up on the walkway), and course congestion (outside the Village limits at Spindler Lane and High View). Grady thanks the Village for their support, especially the Fire Department, as they helped to ensure there were numerous certified people out on the lake.

The marathon and other endurance activities on Memorial Day weekend needed more resources, registrations, and resources. Grady stated the idea was grand in scope and a great idea, but there are things that could be changed. Grady discussed the possibility of making the event a series, with one held in Spring, Summer, and Fall. It was difficult to find enough volunteers and staffing levels for all the events. Overall there were about 400 participants and about half were in running events, with no heat injuries. This number was below expectations. Grady has a mitigation list, which over the coming months he will look to see what is the best option for the event going forward. Some possible thoughts are: make the event a half marathon and a 10 k run and eliminate the marathon, have better communication, select a different weekend that is not as family oriented as Memorial Day, either redesign the courses or the time of the events to eliminate traffic issues, and look at access to local businesses and residents with the events being held over a long duration. Grady stated the Midwest Regional Championships will be held at the Elkhart Lake triathlon next year.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

AUGUST BUILDING PERMIT REPORT – Moioffer

The Board received an e-mailed spreadsheet showing the current building permits for August 2010.

ADMINISTRATION AND FINANCE COMMITTEE – Sadiq

- 1) The Committee reviewed the Village's 2009 Financial Audit from Paul Corson. Corson provided a full explanation of the audit at the Committee meeting. The Village is in good financial shape. There are three components to the audit the water, the CDA/TIF, and the general account. Sadiq stated the water account breaks even every year, the TIF should be closing in about 2012, but the general account was slightly distorted with the sale of bonds for the fire house in 2009. The Village has enough money in undesignated accounts to cover the recommended 3-4 month cash flow expenses for the Village.
- 2) The 2010 budget review was tabled at the Committee meeting.
- 3) The 2011 budget process, details, and guidelines will be given to the department heads in the coming week and results should be back to start the process in next few weeks.
- 4) It was decided to hold off on direct deposits as there is a \$750 charge for that computer module and \$35 a month fee from the bank for a handling fee.
- 5) On-line tax payments are moving forward and there will be no costs for this.
- 6) The employee manual should be available for employees to look over sometime in October.
- 7) The Committee reviewed the 2010 Assessor's Review. Moioffer will make copies of the review for the remainder of the Board.

PUBLIC WORKS – Wolf

- 1) The Crestwood/Moraine Street resurfacing project appears to be completed, but the Village has not received the official notice.
- 2) The Industrial Drive sanitary sewer was lined. This was completed around August 30th and 31st.
- 3) The sewer televising along Highway 67 needs a different crew in order to complete. To pay for this about \$1,000 will be taken out of the sewer fund. There may be issues in this area that need to be budgeted, after the televising is complete.
- 4) There is a wellhead protection plan in place for Well #3, but the Committee is looking to have a plan in place for Well #1. This is a work in progress.

MUNICIPAL PLANNING AND DEVELOPMENT – Wolf

- 1) The Committee is working with Quasius on the dollar figures to convert a section of the old fire house into a storage room.

PRESIDENTS REPORT – Rudnick

- 1) The quarterly Heads of Government Meeting was held in Sheboygan. Much of the discussion dealt with e-cycling. There is no consistency between municipalities on what they are doing for e-cycling. One community is using Waukesha another is doing something at their own transfer site, while other are just informing residents of the 4 or 5 locations where e-waste can be taken. At the meeting information on the County's Emerald Ash Boer Plan was discussed. Also, the County will be redistricted after the census information is gathered and at that point the Village will need to redistrict its wards. Rudnick also received a list of the countywide priorities, he will pass this information along to the rest of the Board Members.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS:

Smoking Ordinance: Second Reading

Trustee Klahn had introduced the following ordinance for Board consideration at a previous meeting and this is the second reading:

**ORDINANCE 547
VILLAGE OF ELKHART LAKE**

WHEREAS, the legislature of the State of Wisconsin has enacted 2009 Wisconsin Act 12, which amends Wisconsin Statutes §101.123, with an effective date of July 5, 2010 which prohibits smoking in enclosed indoor areas that are public places or places of employment; and

WHEREAS, the Wisconsin Statute §101.123, as amended grants authority to the Village to enact an ordinance to protect the health and comfort of the public from the effects of second-hand smoke;

NOW, THEREFORE, the Board of Trustees of the Village of Elkhart Lake does hereby ordain as follows:

25.00 Smoking Prohibited in Certain Areas

(1) Intent and purpose. It is recognized that smoking is not only hazardous to the health of those who smoke, but also to the health of non-smokers when in the presence of those who are smoking. Therefore, in accordance with the 2009 State of Wisconsin Act 12, and the adoption of Wisconsin Statute § 101.123 hereto, the purpose of this ordinance is to protect the public health, comfort, safety and welfare by prohibiting smoking in certain places.

(2) Definitions. For purposes of this section, the following terms have the meaning indicated:

Bar means an establishment that is devoted to the serving of alcoholic beverages for consumption by guests on the premises and in which the serving of food is only incidental to the consumption of those beverages, including but not limited to, taverns, nightclubs, cocktail lounges, and cabarets.

Business means a sole proprietorship, partnership, joint venture, corporation, or other business entity, either for-profit or not-for-profit, including retail establishments where goods or services are sold; professional corporations and other entities where legal, medical, dental, engineering, architectural, or other professional services are delivered; and private clubs.

Employee means a person who is employed by an employer in consideration for direct or indirect monetary wages or profit, and a person who volunteers his or her services for a non-profit entity..

Employer means a person, business, partnership, association, corporation, including a municipal corporation, trust, or non-profit entity that employs the services of one or more individual persons.

Enclosed Area means all space between a floor and ceiling that is enclosed on all sides by permanent or temporary walls or windows (exclusive of doorways), which extend from the floor to the ceiling.

Health Care Facility means an office or institution providing care or treatment of diseases, whether physical, mental, or emotional, or other medical, physiological, or psychological conditions, including but not limited to, hospitals, rehabilitation hospitals or other clinics, including weight control clinics, nursing homes, long-term care facilities, homes for the aging or chronically ill, laboratories, and offices of surgeons, chiropractors, physical therapists, physicians, psychiatrists, dentists, and all specialists within these professions. This definition shall include all waiting rooms, hallways, private rooms, semiprivate rooms, and wards within health care facilities.

Place of Employment means an area under the control of a public or private employer that employees normally frequent during the course of employment, including, but not limited to, work areas, private offices, employee lounges, restrooms, conference rooms, meeting rooms, classrooms, employee cafeterias, elevators and hallways. A private residence (including, without limitation, an apartment) is not a "place of employment" unless it is used as a child care, adult day care, or health care facility. An outside area, or a structure which may include a roof, and may include walls which cover up to 50% of the perimeter of the structure, is not a "place of employment," providing that the structure and its location permit natural air flow to rapidly dissipate second hand smoke.

Public Place means an enclosed area to which the public is invited or in which the public is permitted, including but not limited to, banks, bars, educational facilities, gaming facilities, health care facilities, hotels and motels, laundromats, public transportation vehicles and facilities, reception areas, restaurants, retail food production and marketing establishments, retail service establishments, retail stores, shopping malls, sports arenas, theaters, and waiting rooms. A private club is a "public place" whether or not open to the public. A private residence (including, without

limitation, an apartment) is not a "public place" unless it is used as a child care, adult day care, or health care facility.

Shopping Mall means an enclosed public walkway or hall area that serves to connect retail or professional establishments.

Smoking means inhaling, exhaling, burning, or carrying any lighted or heated - cigar, cigarette, pipe or any other lighted tobacco smoking equipment in any manner or in any form.

Sports Arena means sports pavilions, stadiums, gymnasiums, health spas, boxing arenas, swimming pools, roller and ice rinks, bowling alleys, or other buildings where members of the general public assemble to engage in physical exercise, participate in athletic competition, or witness sports or other events.

(3) Prohibition of Smoking in Village Owned or Operated Areas. Smoking is prohibited in enclosed areas of all buildings and facilities owned or operated by the Village, in all Village owned or operated vehicles. Every Village owned or operated building shall have at least one (1) entrance which is smoke free.

(4) Prohibition of Smoking in Public Places. Smoking is prohibited in all public places within the Village, and every building which is a public place shall have at least one (1) entrance which is smoke free.

(5) Prohibition of Smoking in Places of Employment.

(a) Smoking is prohibited in all places of employment within the Village, and every building which is a place of employment shall have at least one (1) entrance which is smoke free.

(b) This prohibition on smoking shall be communicated to all existing employees by the effective date of this Ordinance and to all prospective employees upon their application for employment.

(6) Declaration of Establishment as Nonsmoking. Notwithstanding any other provision of this Ordinance, an owner, operator, manager, or other person in control of an establishment, facility, or outdoor area may declare that entire establishment, facility, or outdoor area as a nonsmoking place. Smoking shall be prohibited in any place in which a sign conforming to the requirements of Section (7)(a) is posted

(7) Posting of Signs.

(a) "No Smoking" signs or the international "No Smoking" symbol (consisting of a pictorial representation of a burning cigarette enclosed in a red circle with a red bar across it) shall be clearly and conspicuously posted in every place where smoking is prohibited by this Ordinance, by the owner, operator, manager, or other person in control of that place.

(b) Every place where smoking is prohibited by this Ordinance shall have posted at every entrance a conspicuous sign clearly stating that smoking is prohibited.

(c) It shall be unlawful for any person to remove, deface, or destroy any sign required by this Ordinance

(d) All ashtrays shall be removed from any area where smoking is prohibited by this Ordinance by the owner, operator, manager, or other person having control of the area.

(8) Enforcement. (a) This Ordinance shall be enforced by the Police Department or an authorized designee.

(b) Notice of the provisions of this Ordinance shall be given to all applicants for a business license in the Village at the time of application and annually thereafter.

(c) Any citizen who desires to register a complaint under this Ordinance may do so with the Police Department.

(d) The Police Department or their designees shall have the power, under law, to enter upon the premises named in this Ordinance to ascertain whether the premises are in compliance with this ordinance.

(e) An owner, manager, operator, or employee of an establishment regulated by this Ordinance shall inform persons violating this Ordinance of the appropriate provisions thereof.

(9) Violations and Penalties

(a) A person who smokes in an area where smoking is prohibited by the provisions of this Ordinance shall be guilty of an infraction, punishable by:

1. A forfeiture not exceeding one hundred dollars (\$100) for a first violation.

(b) A person who removes, defaces, or destroys any sign required by this Ordinance shall be guilty of an infraction, punishable by a forfeiture not exceeding fifty dollars (\$50).

(c) Except as otherwise provided in Section (9)(a), a person who owns, manages, operates, or otherwise controls a public place or place of employment and who fails to comply with the provisions of this Ordinance shall be guilty of an infraction, punishable by:

1. A forfeiture not exceeding one hundred dollars (\$100) for a first violation.

2. A forfeiture not exceeding two hundred dollars (\$200) for a second violation within twelve (12) months of one (1) previous violation.

3. A forfeiture not exceeding three hundred dollars (\$300) for each additional violation within twelve (12) months of two (2) or more previous violations.

(d) Each day on which a violation of this Ordinance occurs shall be considered a separate and distinct violation.

(10) Other Applicable Laws This Ordinance shall not be interpreted or construed to permit smoking where it is otherwise restricted by other applicable laws.

(11) Severability. If any provision, clause, sentence, or paragraph of this Ordinance or the application thereof to any person or circumstances shall be held invalid, that invalidity shall not affect the other provisions of this Ordinance which can be given effect without the invalid

provision or application, and to this end the provisions of this Ordinance are declared to be severable.

2010 Budget Amendment II

The 2010 Budget Amendment II-Resolution Sixteen 2010 was introduced by Sadiq. Moioffer explained that this resolution moves library contingency funds into the general library funds, as expenses were higher than expected this year. The amendment also allows for the budget adjustments necessary for the salary of the assistant clerk. The adjustments come from two places: the Village and the water utility.

(Klahn/Garton) moved and seconded to approve the Budget Amendment II-Resolution Sixteen 2010.

RESOLUTION DESIGNATING WARD FOUR

WHEREAS, the 2000 Census has determined that there are one thousand, twenty-one (1021) residents in the Village of Elkhart Lake, Sheboygan County, State of Wisconsin, and

WHEREAS, Wisconsin Statute 5.15 mandates the division of the Village of Elkhart Lake into wards, and

WHEREAS, the Village of Elkhart Lake divided into Ward 1 and Ward 2 after the 2000 Census, and

WHEREAS, Wisconsin Statute 5.15 mandates that in mid-decade, all annexations constitute a new ward

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Village of Elkhart Lake create ward 4 with a population of zero as outlined on the map of Exhibit A and the attached legal description Exhibit B and as described as follows:

WARD 4 - All properties north, northwest of the westerly most property line of the Village of Elkhart Lake along Gottfried Street (County Highway J) and northwest of the intersection of Birchwood Drive (County Highway JP) and Gottfried Street

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that all wards shall continue to be combined for voting purposes.

SCCA Banners

The Village granted permission to the SCCA to hang banners last year. The SCCA would like permission to hang the banners again this year. The Board discussed that anyone wishing to hang banners from the street lights need to have banners the size of the Village's brackets and need to use the Village's contractor to hang these banners. The gentleman who hangs the banners is only available a few days next week, so the SCCA will need to contact him soon.

(Garton/Klahn) moved and seconded to grant permission to the SCCA to hang banners, as long as they are hung by the Village approved contractor, at the SCCA's expense.

Klahn stated the Village needs to develop a written policy for the hanging of banners in the Village.

TRUSTEE REPORTS

Trustee Klahn inquired about the plans for the First Responder Building, and if there are no plans Klahn asked which committee will work on these plans. Rudnick stated the CDA and Economic Development Committee will look at possible uses for the building. Rudnick stated if people are interested in renting the building to let him know. Steve Rautmann needs to assess the condition of the building. Klahn also asked about Mr. Stephanie's sign. The sign needs to be updated.

Trustee Wolf stated the SCCA runoffs will be held in a couple weeks. Wolf stated that this year is when they will nationally decide where the SCCA runoffs will be held for the next three years. Wolf suggested that the Village send a letter stating they would love for the SCCA runoffs to continue at Elkhart Lake in the years ahead.

COMMUNICATIONS

Moioffer provided the Board members with copies of FOCUS, Bay-Lake Regional Planning Newsletter, Lake Tides, and the League Letter. Moioffer stated “Columns,” “The Researcher,” and “The Wisconsin Taxpayer” are available in the office for review. A letter was read from Scott Christopher regarding a water patrol issue. Christopher was pulled over by the water patrol and did not have any life vests and asked if he had ties to the community. He was asked this because if there are no ties to the community, the person needs to pay the fine immediately. Christopher did not understand why he was asked about having ties to the community. This was a misunderstanding and has been addressed with staff.

CLERK’S REPORT

Zoning Changes from Public Hearing

The Board received a copy of the planning commission minutes, which included the latest zoning changes, including those changes that were addressed based on the comments from the public hearing.

Moioffer stated that a new policy will be starting after tonight’s board meeting in which, she will provide memos to Rich, Steve, and Randy to inform them of any issues raised at the Board Meeting. This will help improve communications with the department heads.

(Wolf/Garton) moved that the meeting be adjourned at 8:11 p.m.

President Rudnick called the meeting to order at 7:00 P.M. with the following Trustees present: Mike Wolf, Rola Ann Klahn, Pam Garton, Richard Sadiq, and Lynn Shovan.

Others in attendance included: Jeanette Moioffer, Clerk; Jessica Potter, Administrative Assistant to Clerk-Treasurer/Administrator.

The Pledge of Allegiance was recited.

The agenda was approved as printed.

Public Comment –

There was no public comment.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

LIBRARY BOARD – Klahn

- 1) The Library Board has formed a hiring committee and a budget committee.
- 2) Klahn reported they hired a new part-time library assistant, Christine Strutz.

MUNICIPAL PLANNING AND DEVELOPMENT – Wolf

- 1) A Committee meeting was held Friday, September 10, 2010 where the Committee reviewed renovation of part of the old fire station for a storage area for Village records. At that meeting the Committee tabled the reconstruction of the building for police department use. Quasius presented bids for construction of the storage area. It would cost \$3,700 for the design and \$24,880 for the construction and completion of the storage area. This project is within budget. The Municipal Planning and Development Committee recommends proceeding to the Village Board for approval. This project would be completed around November. Moioffer stated they need room for 92 bank boxes and this storage space will hold about 160 bank boxes.
- 2) The police department also asked to get an access door to the old fire station from their current offices, as they are storing equipment and squad cars there. A bid of \$3,637 was received from Quasius, but needs to be completed at the same time as the storage room construction. The Committee recommended creating this police access at a cost of \$3,637. The Committee wants to ensure the door placement allows for future reconstruction of the old fire station.

PUBLIC HEALTH AND WELFARE – Klahn

- 1) The Public Health and Welfare Committee met with Larry from Larry's Hauling on Friday, September 17, 2010 to discuss the issues with Sharpe's dumpster. It was decided that it will go back to the price that was discussed earlier in the year with Matt from Larry's Hauling.

PLANNING COMMISSION – Rudnick

The Planning Commission met on September 15, 2010 and reviewed the proposed zoning ordinance. The zoning ordinance only needs revisions to the parking requirements. The Planning Commission is working with Sargento on an expansion project. Rudnick stated the Planning Commission will continue to move forward with these plans and then when necessary bring the

project to the Village Board. Part of the proposed project includes the relocation of West Street Wolf stated that parking appears to be of the greatest urgency. The Planning Commission will look at possible ways to cover the cost of the road.

NORTHERN MORAINES UTILITY – Moioffer

Moioffer reported that Northern Moraine really has begun the second module of construction of phase II. If Village representative is unable to attend in the future, Rudnick would be happy to fill in at the meetings.

JT. FIRE STATION COMMITTEE – Rudnick

- 1) The First Responders have moved to the fire station. An agreement was reached with the fire department for a back office space.
- 2) Rudnick reported that they will be reviewing the landscaping and there may be some issues, but it is a new lawn and it seems to be coming in very well.
- 3) The final fire station budget will be presented to the Joint Committee on September 22, then it will need to be approved by the Village Board and Town of Rhine Board. It will be part of the Village's regular budget process. Moioffer stated that some budget items the Village does not split, for example hydrant rental, fire inspection services, etc. Wolf asked about the ownership and budgeting of Fireman's Park. Moioffer stated the Village pays insurance for the property, but the fire department would handle the costs of maintenance, new buildings, etc. Fireman's Park is strictly owned by fire departments, but if the fire department disbanded the park would become a village park.

JT. EMERGENCY RESPONSE COMMITTEE – Moioffer

- 1) The Joint Emergency Response Committee is putting the finishing touches on the book. Two training sessions will be set up on October 27 and November 10 at the Fire Station at 6:00 p.m. Board members and department heads need to be at both meetings. These meetings will be held jointly with the Town of Rhine and Mark Landgraf will conduct the training.
- 2) The book will be for the Village of Elkhart Lake and Town of Rhine joint use, while some parts will be specifically for the Village or for the Town.

ADMINISTRATION AND FINANCE -- Sadiq

- 1) The Committee met this evening. The Committee is recommending a change to the employee health insurance. This would include a deductible of \$500 for single health coverage and \$1000 for family health coverage, which will lead to a savings of about \$9,000 for the insurance premiums next year for the Village.
- 2) Benefits for part-time employees were discussed. The Committee decided the Village will not extend benefits except health insurance and retirement for anyone working less than 32 hours a week for the year 2011. This is subject to change depending upon the passage of employee handbooks. Garton asked for clarification on extending health insurance to part-time employees. Moioffer stated that those in the state retirement system, are eligible for the state health insurance. If you are in state retirement system, you are eligible for health insurance.
- 3) The first meeting for the 2011 budget will be held on Tuesday October, 5 at 8:00 A. M. where the committee will review the outline of the budget, including the department heads' budgets.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS

Quasius Contract – It has been recommended by the Municipal Planning and Development Committee to complete the storage room and police access to the garage. The design costs for the storage room is \$3,700.00 and the cost of the construction for the storage room is \$24,880.00. The cost of the police access door is \$3,637.00. These two items will be voted on separately.

(Shovan/Garton) moved and seconded to approve the plans and construction for the storage room at a cost of \$3,700.00 for design and \$24,880.00 for construction.

Motion Carried Unanimously

(Klahn/Shovan) moved and seconded to approve the construction of the access door from the police department to the garage at a cost of \$3,637.00, but the location of the door should be verified for future police department remodeling.

Motion Carried Unanimously

No Smoking Ordinance - Trustee Klahn had introduced the following ordinance for Board consideration at a previous meeting and this is the final reading:

(Wolf/Garton) moved and seconded to enact Ordinance 547, No Smoking Ordinance.

**ORDINANCE 547
VILLAGE OF ELKHART LAKE**

WHEREAS, the legislature of the State of Wisconsin has enacted 2009 Wisconsin Act 12, which amends Wisconsin Statutes §101.123, with an effective date of July 5, 2010 which prohibits smoking in enclosed indoor areas that are public places or places of employment; and

WHEREAS, the Wisconsin Statute §101.123, as amended grants authority to the Village to enact an ordinance to protect the health and comfort of the public from the effects of second-hand smoke;

NOW, THEREFORE, the Board of Trustees of the Village of Elkhart Lake does hereby ordain as follows:

25.00 Smoking Prohibited in Certain Areas

(1) Intent and purpose. It is recognized that smoking is not only hazardous to the health of those who smoke, but also to the health of non-smokers when in the presence of those who are smoking. Therefore, in accordance with the 2009 State of Wisconsin Act 12, and the adoption of Wisconsin Statute § 101.123 hereto, the purpose of this ordinance is to protect the public health, comfort, safety and welfare by prohibiting smoking in certain places.

(2) Definitions. For purposes of this section, the following terms have the meaning indicated:

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consumption of those beverages, including but not limited to, taverns, nightclubs, cocktail lounges, and cabarets.

Business means a sole proprietorship, partnership, joint venture, corporation, or other business entity, either for-profit or not-for-profit, including retail establishments where goods or services are sold; professional corporations and other entities where legal, medical, dental, engineering, architectural, or other professional services are delivered; and private clubs.

Employee means a person who is employed by an employer in consideration for direct or indirect monetary wages or profit, and a person who volunteers his or her services for a non-profit entity..

Employer means a person, business, partnership, association, corporation, including a municipal corporation, trust, or non-profit entity that employs the services of one or more individual persons.

Enclosed Area means all space between a floor and ceiling that is enclosed on all sides by permanent or temporary walls or windows (exclusive of doorways), which extend from the floor to the ceiling.

Health Care Facility means an office or institution providing care or treatment of diseases, whether physical, mental, or emotional, or other medical, physiological, or psychological conditions, including but not limited to, hospitals, rehabilitation hospitals or other clinics, including weight control clinics, nursing homes, long-term care facilities, homes for the aging or chronically ill, laboratories, and offices of surgeons, chiropractors, physical therapists, physicians, psychiatrists, dentists, and all specialists within these professions. This definition shall include all waiting rooms, hallways, private rooms, semiprivate rooms, and wards within health care facilities.

Place of Employment means an area under the control of a public or private employer that employees normally frequent during the course of employment, including, but not limited to, work areas, private offices, employee lounges, restrooms, conference rooms, meeting rooms, classrooms, employee cafeterias, elevators and hallways. A private residence (including, without limitation, an apartment) is not a "place of employment" unless it is used as a child care, adult day care, or health care facility. An outside area, or a structure which may include a roof, and may include walls which cover up to 50% of the perimeter of the structure, is not a "place of employment," providing that the structure and its location permit natural air flow to rapidly dissipate second hand smoke.

Public Place means an enclosed area to which the public is invited or in which the public is permitted, including but not limited to, banks, bars, educational facilities, gaming facilities, health care facilities, hotels and motels, laundromats, public transportation vehicles and facilities, reception areas, restaurants, retail food production and marketing establishments, retail service establishments, retail stores, shopping malls, sports arenas, theaters, and waiting rooms. A private club is a "public place" whether or not open to the public. A private residence (including, without limitation, an apartment) is not a "public place" unless it is used as a child care, adult day care, or health care facility.

Shopping Mall means an enclosed public walkway or hall area that serves to connect retail or professional establishments.

Smoking means inhaling, exhaling, burning, or carrying any lighted or heated - cigar, cigarette, pipe or any other lighted tobacco smoking equipment in any manner or in any form.

Sports Arena means sports pavilions, stadiums, gymnasiums, health spas, boxing arenas, swimming pools, roller and ice rinks, bowling alleys, or other buildings where members of the general public assemble to engage in physical exercise, participate in athletic competition, or

witness sports or other events.

(3) Prohibition of Smoking in Village Owned or Operated Areas. Smoking is prohibited in enclosed areas of all buildings and facilities owned or operated by the Village, in all Village owned or operated vehicles. Every Village owned or operated building shall have at least one (1) entrance which is smoke free.

(4) Prohibition of Smoking in Public Places. Smoking is prohibited in all public places within the Village, and every building which is a public place shall have at least one (1) entrance which is smoke free.

(5) Prohibition of Smoking in Places of Employment.

(a) Smoking is prohibited in all places of employment within the Village, and every building which is a place of employment shall have at least one (1) entrance which is smoke free.

(b) This prohibition on smoking shall be communicated to all existing employees by the effective date of this Ordinance and to all prospective employees upon their application for employment.

(6) Declaration of Establishment as Nonsmoking. Notwithstanding any other provision of this Ordinance, an owner, operator, manager, or other person in control of an establishment, facility, or outdoor area may declare that entire establishment, facility, or outdoor area as a nonsmoking place. Smoking shall be prohibited in any place in which a sign conforming to the requirements of Section (7)(a) is posted

(7) Posting of Signs.

(a) "No Smoking" signs or the international "No Smoking" symbol (consisting of a pictorial representation of a burning cigarette enclosed in a red circle with a red bar across it) shall be clearly and conspicuously posted in every place where smoking is prohibited by this Ordinance, by the owner, operator, manager, or other person in control of that place.

(b) Every place where smoking is prohibited by this Ordinance shall have posted at every entrance a conspicuous sign clearly stating that smoking is prohibited.

(c) It shall be unlawful for any person to remove, deface, or destroy any sign required by this Ordinance

(d) All ashtrays shall be removed from any area where smoking is prohibited by this Ordinance by the owner, operator, manager, or other person having control of the area.

(8) Enforcement. (a) This Ordinance shall be enforced by the Police Department or an authorized designee.

(b) Notice of the provisions of this Ordinance shall be given to all applicants for a business license in the Village at the time of application and annually thereafter.

(c)

ny citizen who desires to register a complaint under this Ordinance may do so with the Police Department.

(d) The Police Department or their designees shall have the power, under law, to enter upon the premises named in this Ordinance to ascertain whether the premises are in compliance with this ordinance.

(e) An owner, manager, operator, or employee of an establishment regulated by this Ordinance shall inform persons violating this Ordinance of the appropriate provisions thereof.

(9) Violations and Penalties

(a) A person who smokes in an area where smoking is prohibited by the provisions of this Ordinance shall be guilty of an infraction, punishable by:

1. A forfeiture not exceeding one hundred dollars (\$100) for a first violation.

(b) A person who removes, defaces, or destroys any sign required by this Ordinance shall be guilty of an infraction, punishable by a forfeiture not exceeding fifty dollars (\$50).

(c) Except as otherwise provided in Section (9)(a), a person who owns, manages, operates, or otherwise controls a public place or place of employment and who fails to comply with the provisions of this Ordinance shall be guilty of an infraction, punishable by:

1. A forfeiture not exceeding one hundred dollars (\$100) for a first violation.

2. A forfeiture not exceeding two hundred dollars (\$200) for a second violation within twelve (12) months of one (1) previous violation.

3. A forfeiture not exceeding three hundred dollars (\$300) for each additional violation within twelve (12) months of two (2) or more previous violations.

(d) Each day on which a violation of this Ordinance occurs shall be considered a separate and distinct violation.

(10) Other Applicable Laws This Ordinance shall not be interpreted or construed to permit smoking where it is otherwise restricted by other applicable laws.

(11) Severability. If any provision, clause, sentence, or paragraph of this Ordinance or the application thereof to any person or circumstances shall be held invalid, that invalidity shall not affect the other provisions of this Ordinance which can be given effect without the invalid provision or application, and to this end the provisions of this Ordinance are declared to be severable.
